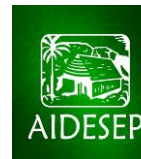

# Geographic location



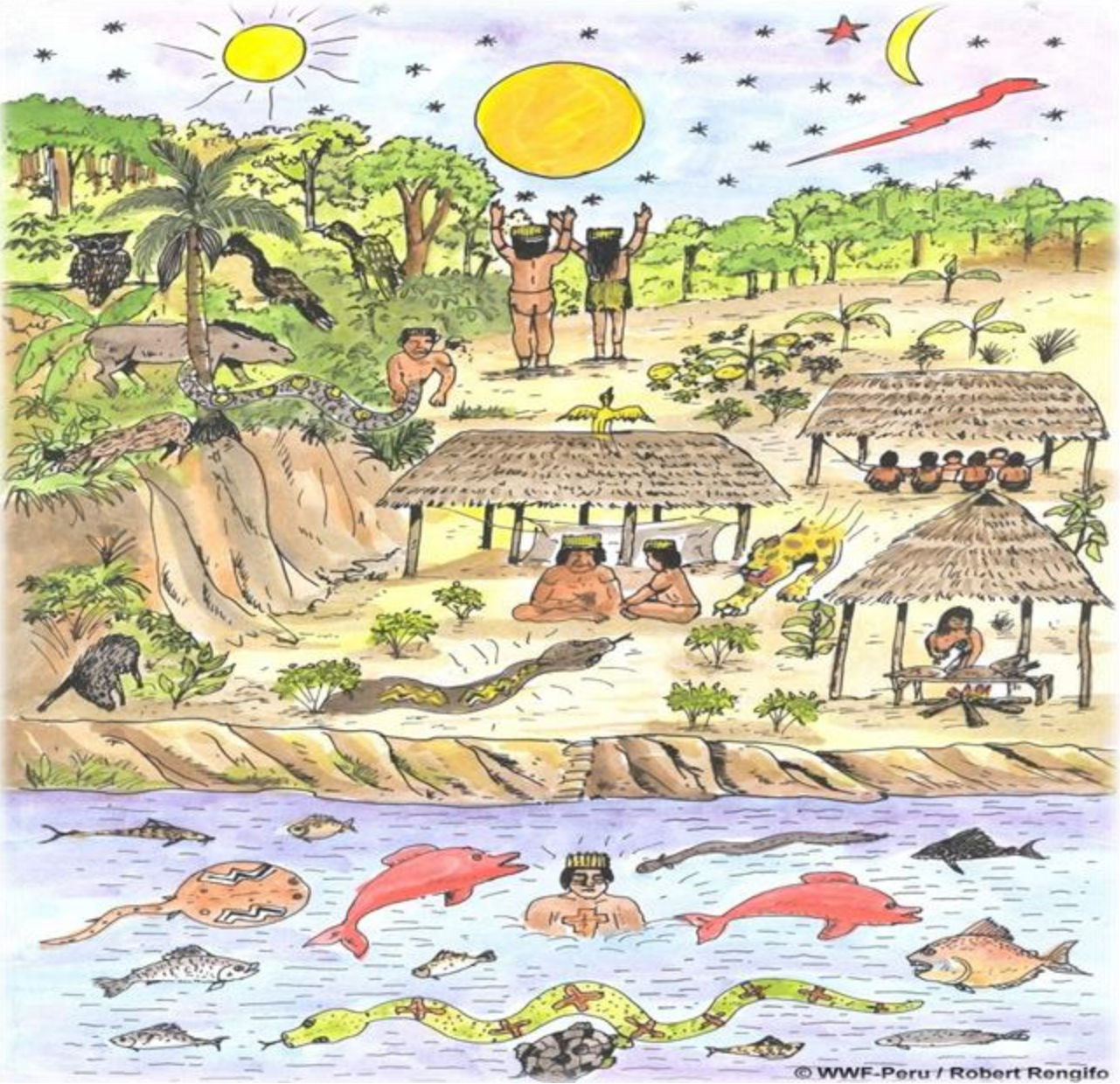

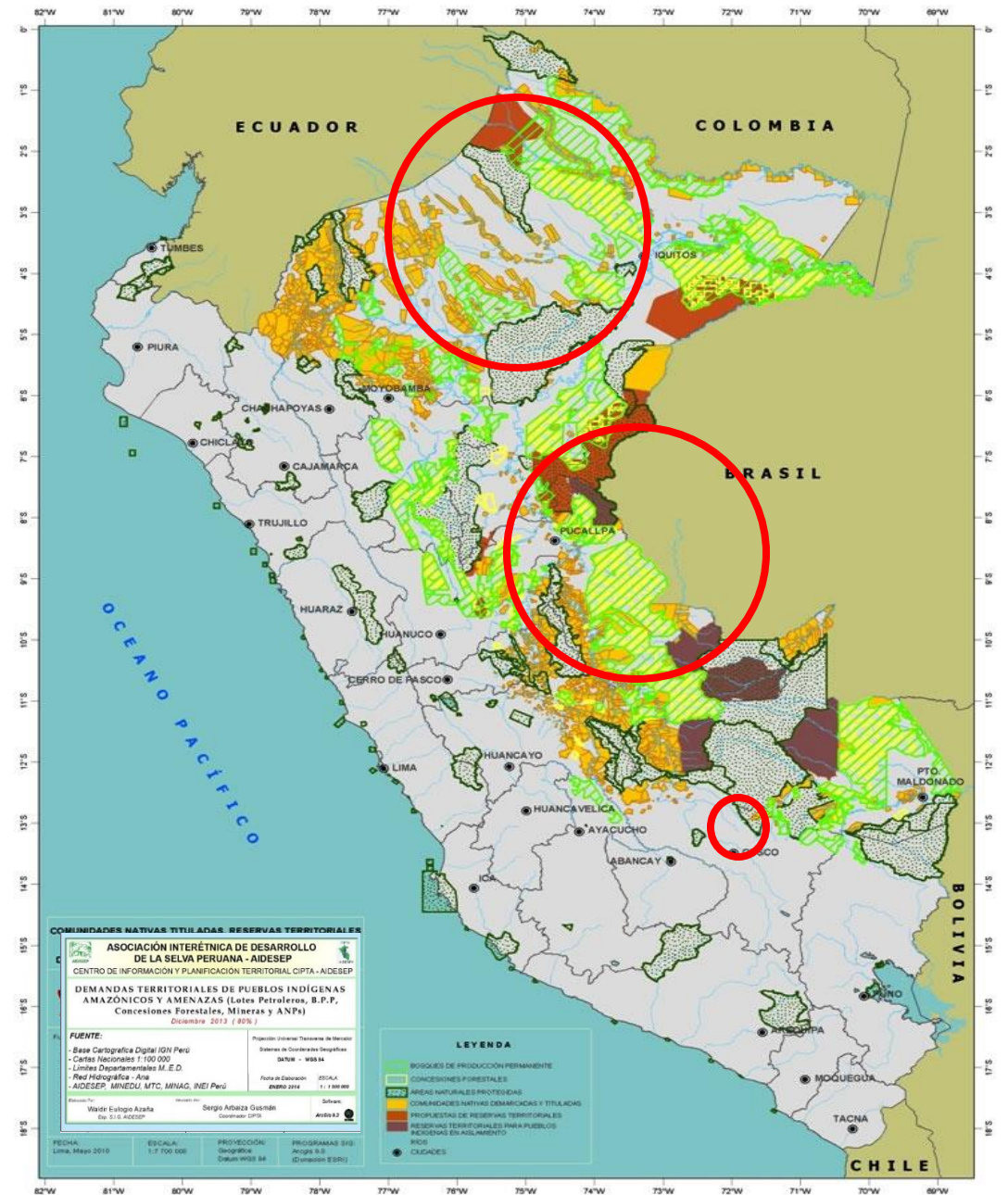
# Indigenous peoples in voluntary isolation and initial contact (PIACI)

**3** Indigenous reserves: Isconahua, Murunahua y MashcoPiro.

**2** territorial reserves to be adecuated to Indigenous reserves: Madre de Dios; Kugapakori, Nahua Nanti y otros.

**2** territorial corridors identified: Pano-Arawak y otros; Corredor Yavarí–Tapiche.

**5** Proposed indigenous reserves: Napo-Tigre, kakataibo, Yavarí-Mirim, Yavarí-Tapiche, Sierra del Divisor Occidental.





# Protection for indigenous peoples in voluntary isolation and initial contact (PIACI)



**Main objective:** Achieve respect for the rights and protection of the physical, sociocultural and territorial integrity of PIACI.



Make visible and **recognize the anthropological importance** of the Territorial Corridors of PIACI.

Strengthen and promote **compliance with national and international regulations** related to the comprehensive protection of the rights of the PIACI in multi-stakeholder scenarios.

Propose a **planning and management mechanism** for the protection of PIACI based on the continuous spaces in which they live and through which they move, identified through the Territorial Corridors.

Overlap with the buffer zone of the Reserve

Lack of titles

Invasions for the illegal use of their natural resources

Overlap between PA and areas of historical use of the community

Not considered by the PA when it lacks property title

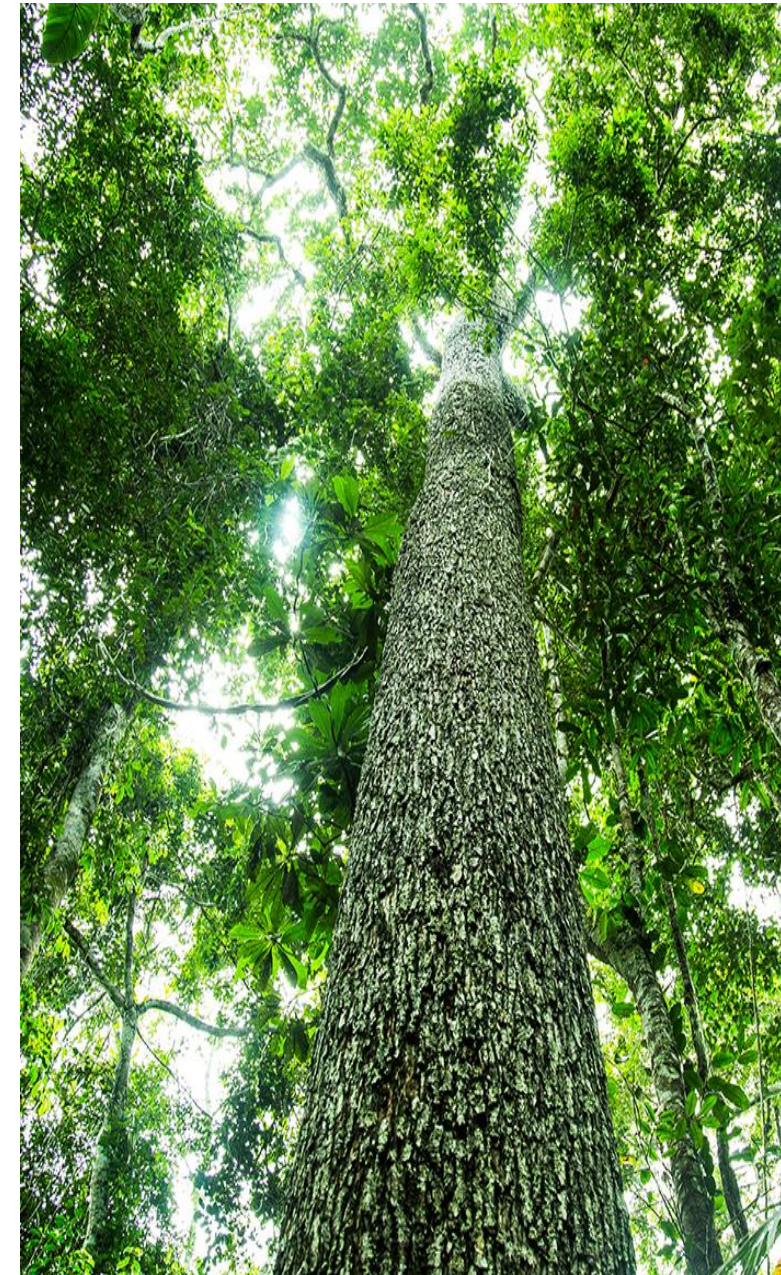

# What we found



- Almost 57 potential **conflicts over indigenous territories**, mostly regarding access to natural resources (Basurto, 2013)
- **Overlapping** rights and lack of **formalization**
- **Insecure titles**
  - *without georeferencing of the territory*
  - *without clear and legal boundaries*

# Remarkable achievements

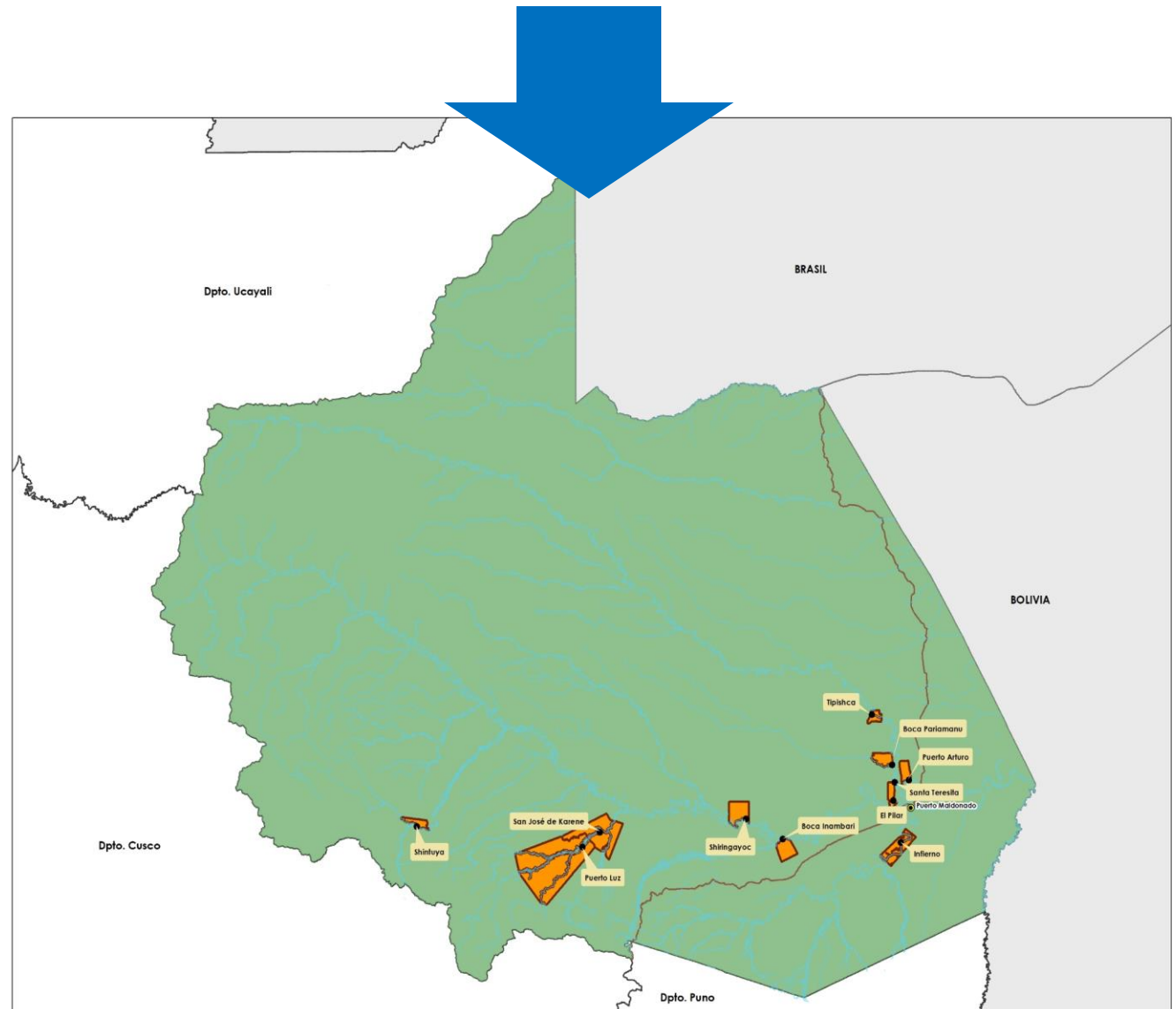
**03** legal-recognized indigenous communities

**03** titled communities accessed state economic incentives

**42,200** hectares with clear and legal boundaries in **07** indigenous communities

**85,000** hectares started titling process

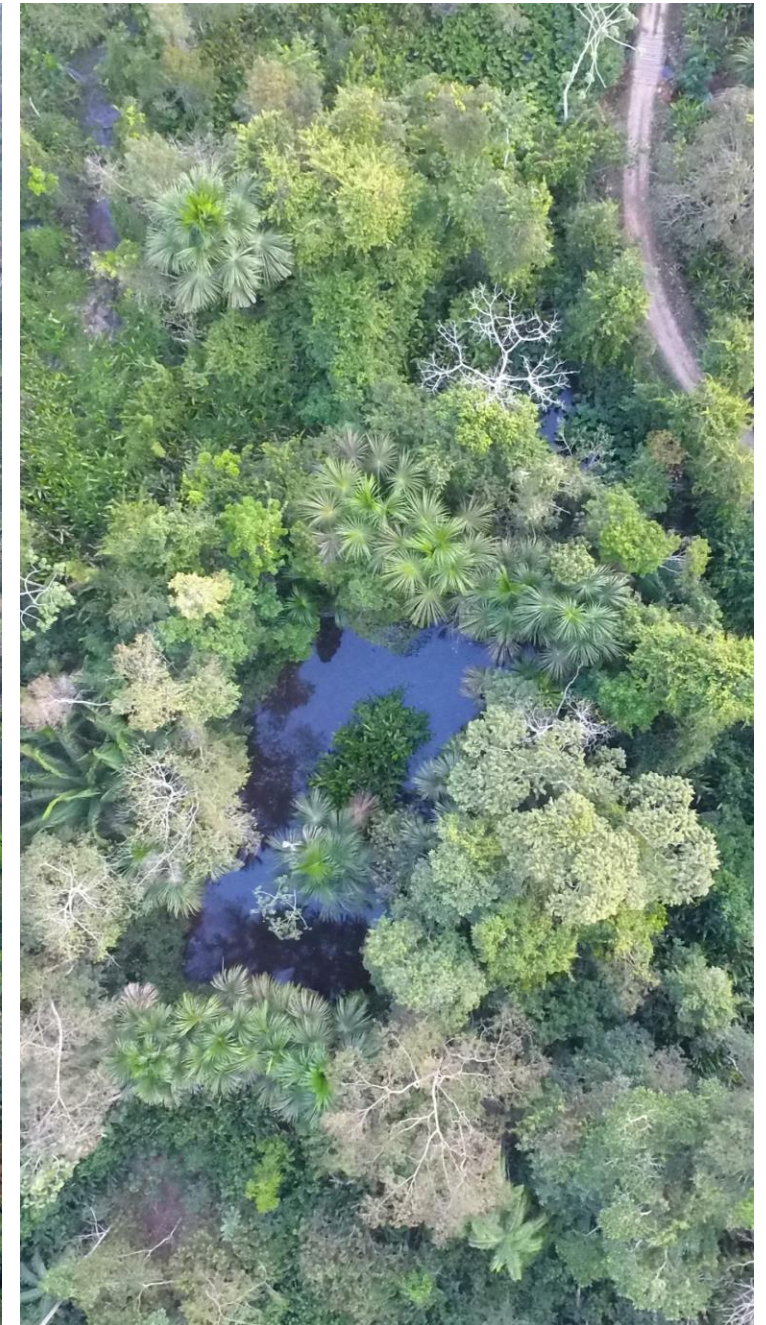
**07** titled indigenous communities



# Next steps:

what happens after the titling process?

- **Forest management** for timber and non-timber products.
- **Legal defense** for indigenous territories against threats.
- Development of **economic incentives** for conservation of forest in indigenous territories such as Programa Bosques.
